The following is Pastor Eric's schedule for office hours:



HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE July 23, 2025 CUC BOARD MEETING

The regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on July 23, 2025, at 6:05 p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge.

ELECTION: It was noted that it was necessary to elect a Moderator to complete the 2025 term. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Gill Laroche to elect Elder Judith Parker to serve as Moderator. Motion passed.

<u>GUEST:</u> Sierra Smith, of Arise, Exceptional Family Resources, was invited into the meeting. She introduced herself and briefly discussed the programs offered. She distributed a flyer outlining the programs and activities for August. She expressed her organization's appreciation of our accommodating their need for space. Ms. Smith was thanked for her presentation and excused from the meeting.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Emeline McShane and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the regular Session minutes of May 21, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the months of May and June 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Connie Oliver to accept the Treasurer's Report for April 2025. Motion passed.

<u>VITAL STATISTICS</u>: Nikolai Adydan, Lorraine Vollmer's great-grandson, will be baptized on Sunday, August 3, 2025.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Rev. Adamcik will be out July 27 – August 1 to chaperone Triennium (PCUSA high school youth conference) in Louisville for our presbytery. He will take Monday, August 4, off to make up for working on his Friday day off. We will have a service run by the worship team on July 27 in his absence.

Rev. Adamcik indicated he is looking into Continuing Education opportunities: probably Union Theological Seminary, depending on class offers. A pulpit swap with Pebble Hill Presbyterian likely will take place sometime in August.

The Synod gathering will take place September 18-20. He is waiting for more information.

Rev. Adamcik said he mentioned Superman at a recent service at First United. They suggested having a movie showing of Superman.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS: Elder Gill Laroche expressed his thanks to Ginnie Busco who continues to clean the church on a weekly basis. Pam Laroche weeded the front flower beds. Gill Laroche, Dave Vollmer and Sean, his employee, mowed the grounds. Gill Laroche constructed a new ramp for the shed. He also collected and returned the bottles and cans. He is waiting to hear from the Town of Dewitt concerning scheduling the fire inspection.

Discussion took place concerning securing the upstairs of the building so that it cannot be accessed by individuals using the fellowship hall or kitchen. It was also noted that, on several occasions, the downstairs door has been found unlocked. It was suggested that an announcement be made concerning this during weekly worship services. We will also consider installing a new, more secure, handle.

Connie Oliver, Leslie DuMond, and representatives of the Master Gardeners program weeded the memorial garden.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Elder Jeannine Parks reported that we honored graduates in June. They were presented with a card of congratulations and a token gift. She is hoping to schedule a Bible study in the fall.

<u>MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM</u>: Elder Emeline McShane reported cards/calls/visits continuing.

MISSIONS: Elder Merle Oswald reported concerning the following mission projects:

St. Matthews Food Pantry - For May, we collected shampoo for the St. Matthew's Food Pantry. We collected a total of 39 bottles! For June, we collected 58 boxes and 12 bags of various pasta for the St. Matthew's Food Pantry. They were delivered by Pat Pease and Merle Oswald on June 30, 2025. For July, we are collecting regular size men's and women's deodorant. For August, we will collect toothbrushes and paste.

The Family of Richard Way sent us a \$500 donation for the food pantry. This was delivered to St. Matthew's by Merle Oswald and Pat Pease. We received a nice thank you note. A note was also sent to the Way family.

Ronald McDonald House – We collected the following items for Ronald McDonald House: Small individual snacks (including chips, pretzels, gold fish, pop tarts), Various decks of cards (including Old Maid, UNO, Crazy 8's, Regular cards), and puzzles for all ages. School Supplies – For August, we will collect school supplies for the ESM schools. Merle Oswald will distribute a list of the supplies needed.

Brown Memorial UMC - On August 24, 2025, we will be hosting a picnic meal at Brown Memorial United Methodist Church. We will be providing hot dogs, salads, etc. First United Church of East Syracuse will join us in this mission project. We will obtain discounted hot dogs from Hoffman's as well as donations of other items.

<u>PASTOR/PARISH RELATIONS:</u> Elder Edward Busco reported he is learning about how the Presbytery and Methodist Conference operate, and the responsibilities of the PPRC. He is also learning about the history of CUC and its relationships with other churches.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE: Elder Leslie DuMond reported we are generating additional funds through our recent efforts to rent the fellowship hall and kitchen. We hope this will continue on a regular basis and help balance the budget.

TECHNOLOGY: Elder Judith Parker reported the Facebook page and website continue to be updated on a regular basis.

WORSHIP: Elder Connie Heidt-Oliver reported as follows:

- Communion Rev. Adamcik served communion by intinction to 24 on June 1.
- Father's Day was celebrated June 15. Pastor Eric blessed the token gifts, magnets with a faith-based message.
- Our graduates were recognized June 22; coffee hour followed after the service.
- June 29 Shirley Pease from Bridgeport UMC covered our pulpit supply need.
- July 6 was a 9:30 a.m. combined service at FUCOES. Rev. Adamcik served communion by intinction to ~ 37. 17 attended from CUC; 16 took communion.
- July 20 Gill Laroche was installed as an Elder.

<u>OLD BUSINESS:</u> Della Brown the proprietor of Puddinglicous, LLC continues to use the kitchen to make various varieties of banana pudding. She sells the pudding at Green Hills Market and other locations. She recently provided some samples which were delicious. KJ Robinson continues to use the kitchen to make moss algae smoothies. He sells this at the regional market and other locations. Both arrangements are working out nicely.

We have still not received the check from Planet Aid. Leslie followed up on July 16. It turns out that they sent the check to the wrong address. This should be straightened out now and we should receive the checks shortly.

Ed & Ed Business Technology has replaced the old copy machine with a newer one. The new machine is much larger. It will be necessary to rearrange the office to accommodate this.

Elder Connie Oliver reported concerning the offer of a free piano. The piano is no longer available. Our piano tuner, Nick Smith, indicated he would help us locate another suitable piano once we are ready in the fall.

The brick installation in the Memorial (Serenity) Garden was completed on June 21. Melanie, a new member of the MGV, weeded twice during July so far. Leslie DuMond and Connie Oliver have also helped. The garden is looking better. No more progress at this time on the garden diagram to show locations of the various plantings.

NEW BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported that on July 10, she and Pastor Eric met with Max Smith and Sierra Smith (not related) of Arise - Exceptional Family Resources (a non-profit 501 C (3) organization) concerning use of the Fellowship Hall every Friday from July 25 - September 12. They will be here from 9 a.m. until around 3 p.m. which includes set up and breakdown. As indicated, they provide programs for disabled adults from age 18 and up. There are approximately 30 participants and each has a mentor. The downstairs parking will be more than sufficient.

After polling the Board, we offered a reduced rate of \$100 per day and waiver of the security deposit. They have been provided with the Building Use Policy and completed the application. The insurance certificate naming CUC as insured has also been received. Sierra is the program coordinator. She will have a check sent monthly. The trash will also be removed and everything put back to the way it is found. It was decided to provide Sierra Smith with a key to the building.

Arise likely will have other events for which they would like to use our facilities. For instance, in November, they host a Friendsgiving meal. We are hopeful that this will become a mutually beneficial relationship.

Elder Leslie DuMond reported the rummage sale will take place on September 19-20. We will not hold it on the second Saturday since that is too close to the upcoming dinner. She has confirmed with Dave Vollmer that we are again welcome to use the greenhouse.

Elder Judith Parker discussed the Sunday coffee service schedule and reminded the Board members that all committees are scheduled to take turns providing a snack.

Discussion took place concerning the possibility of installing air conditioning in the sanctuary and/or the upstairs of the building. Elder Gill Laroche will look into obtaining quotes.

The next meeting of the CUC Board will be August 27, 2025, at 6:00 p.m.
