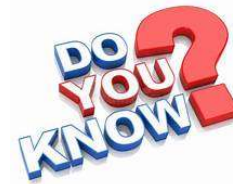
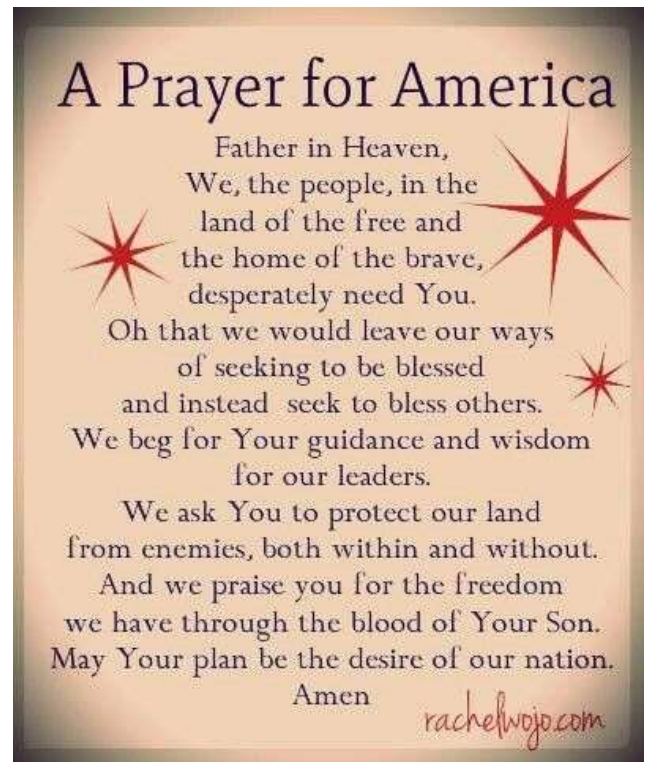

**You're never too young to make a difference.**



On June 7, Pastor Eric’s sermon “Stand By Me” reflected on the scripture reading, Hosea 6:1-6. This passage outlines God’s desire for genuine repentance, steadfast love, and intimate knowledge of Him and that God is not interested in empty religious duties, sacrifices, or outward shows of faith if they are disconnected from a loving, obedient heart. Holy Communion was served to 20 by Elders Pat Pease and Judi Parker.

On June 14, Pastor Eric’s sermon on Genesis 18:1-15 recounted the Lord and two companions visiting Abraham at Mamre. After Abraham welcomed them with a meal, the Lord promised Sarah would have a son within a year. Sarah laughed in disbelief because of their age and when God asked, “Is anything too hard for the Lord?” she denied laughing out of fear. God replied, “Yes, you did laugh.” As promised, Sarah gave birth to Isaac, whose name means “he laughs,” and later said, “God has made laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh with me.” God’s plans often exceed our understanding, and we are never too old to receive His goodness!

On June 21, Pastor Eric’s sermon on Genesis 21:8-21 continued the story of Abraham and Sarah through the account of Hagar and Ishmael being sent into the wilderness. Driven out by Sarah’s jealousy, they faced death from thirst, yet God heard Ishmael’s cry, rescued them, and kept His promise to make Ishmael a great nation. This passage reminds us that God does not abandon the vulnerable; He hears their cries and provides for them, calling us to listen and respond because we, too, have been heard.

June 28 brought Elder Lynn Jacques to our pulpit as Pastor Eric was away at the General Assembly in Milwaukee. Lynn’s sermon, “Where 2 or 3 are Gathered”, reflected on Matthew 18:15-20 which outlines Jesus’s instructions for conflict resolution, church discipline, and the power of unified prayer. Jesus assures His followers that whenever two or three gather in His name, He is directly present with them, and that prayers made in unity are honored by the Father. We also honored our graduates during the service and recognized the last day of the choir before their summer break with a heartfelt round of applause.

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE May 27, 2026 CUC BOARD MEETING

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on May 27, 2026, at 6:01 p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Leslie DuMond opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Judith Parker served as moderator.

**MINUTES:** A motion was properly made by Elder Valerie Warfield and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the regular Session minutes of April 22, 2026. Motion passed.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of April 2026. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Georgia Clifford to accept the Treasurer's Report for April 2026. Motion passed.

**PASTOR'S REPORT:** Rev. Adamcik reported he attended the Joint Presbytery meeting on May 16, 2026. This was held at the First Presbyterian Church in Cazenovia. It was a meet and greet type event attended by representatives of the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse and the Susquehanna Presbytery. Jim Schuyler attended on behalf of CUC.

He also attended the Early Ministry Institute hosted by the Synod of the Northeast, in Silver Bay, New York on May 18 – 22. Lynn Jacques provided pulpit supply on May 24. This was a retreat type event. This is his second time attending this conference.

He will be attending General Assembly, hosted by PCUSA General Assembly, which will take place in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on June 22 – July 2. He discussed the purpose of this conference and noted that all expenses will be covered by the Presbytery. The General Assembly is the council to the whole church and it is representative of the unity of the synods, presbyteries, sessions, and congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Lynn Jacques will provide pulpit supply on June 28.

**BUILDING AND GROUNDS:** Elder Douglas Kliphon reported that: Ginnie Busco is continuing to do weekly cleaning. Doug, Sheri, and Jeremy Kliphon mowed the grounds along with an employee of Vollmer's. Dan Christen and two friends also mowed. Judd DuMond weed whacked. Gill and Pam Laroche cleaned up, weeded, and mulched the upper gardens. Leslie DuMond and Judi Parker did some weeding in the memorial garden.

Gill Laroche cleaned up the boiler room and made brackets for the mops, etc.

ZJ Commercial kitchen supply was contacted by Gill Laroche and has repaired the preheater for the dishwasher which is now working properly.

Elder Douglas Kliphon reported on a letter received from the Town of Dewitt concerning the requirement of installing a backflow valve. He reached out to the Town of Dewitt and was advised that this requirement is not yet in effect. He will monitor this situation.

Elder Douglas Kliphon noted he is working on obtaining an air conditioner for the pastor's office. Discussion took place concerning the various options.

**CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:** We will be recognizing graduates in June. A date of June 28, 2026 is suggested. We will have four graduates. Jeffrey Clark, grandson of Doug and Sheri Kliphon, will graduate from high school. Devon DeForest, grandson of Pat Pease, will also graduate from high school. Sarah O'Neill and Natalie Pidkaminy (granddaughter of Judi Parker), graduated from college. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to recognize graduates on Sunday, June 28. Motion passed.

**MEMBERSHIP AND HOSPITALITY:** Elder Valerie Warfield reported a letter was sent to approximately 38 individuals that we have not seen in a while. We have not received any responses.

The 50-Year member recognition took place on May 3. This year we welcomed Mary Jane and Joe Molina and Edward Eggert to the group. The Molina's were each presented with a certificate and Mary Jane received a long stem rose. Because he was unable to be with us, a certificate was sent to Edward Eggert. With the passing of Lois Klein last fall, we welcomed a new longest member, Karen Brignall (73 years). She was presented with a beautiful bouquet of flowers. We all enjoyed a delicious cake after the worship service.

Elder Valerie Warfield is working on putting together a membership directory.

**MISSIONS:** The following mission projects were discussed:

**St. Matthews Food Pantry** – For May, are collecting dish soap for St. Matthew's food pantry. For June, we will collect cereal.

**S.A.M. (Senior Adult Ministry)** – We will be collecting monetary donations to help support the S.A.M. program which is held every Tuesday and Thursday at the North Manlius Church. The

program is in financial crisis. Checks should be made payable to CUC.

Adopt-A-Highway – On Sunday, April 26, following the worship service, we picked up garbage from the corner of Route 298 and Fly Road up to the Thruway Bridge. Georgia Clifford, Jodi Jones, Connie and Victor Oliver, Merle Oswald, and Judy and Jim Schuyler participated. The brave souls cleaned up a deer carcass! Thank you Georgia for heading up this mission project!

STAFF/PARISH RELATIONS: Elder Connie Oliver submitted a written report. We have received 30 out of 40 responses to the survey, 75%! Many thoughtful answers were provided. The team met to discuss the results and next steps are being determined.

Elder Connie Oliver also reported that, in early April, she attended a two session Presbytery-led zoom workshop, “Reimagining and Remapping the Religious Landscape.: Chaos Before a New Ordering”. Author Rev. Gil Rendle’s monograph invited us to “ask a deeper question: where are people actually finding meaning, belonging, and purpose today?”.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE: Elder Leslie DuMond reported the letter to members requesting contributions to offset the per capita and apportionment requirements for the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse and the UNY Methodist Annual Conference was sent on May 1. Contributions of \$1,100 have been received to date.

TECHNOLOGY: Elder Georgia Clifford reported the Facebook page and website continue to be updated on a regular basis. We are continuing to work with First United to put together a shared calendar.

WORSHIP: Elder Judith Parker reported that communion was served to 28 on May 3 by Elders Jeannine Parks and Valerie Warfield. Connie Oliver and Judi Parker decorated the sanctuary for Pentecost in red with flame accents. (Jerome O’Neill also assisted by hanging decorations from the lights!) Elder Lynn Jacques served as pulpit supply on May 24 while Pastor Eric was away at the Early Ministry Institute.

OLD BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported further comments were provided concerning the job descriptions for the committees and other positions at the church. The document is currently under further review.

A brief discussion took place concerning installation of diaper changing stations. The matter was tabled.

It was noted that Jim Schuyler has agreed to serve as the Presbytery representative for CUC.

During the last meeting, Elder Pam Laroche reported she will not be available for the October 24 chicken and biscuit dinner. Discussions

with various individuals have taken place concerning whether to cancel this dinner. By motion made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Georgia Clifford it was decided to cancel the October 24 dinner.

Discussion took place concerning installing additional lighting in the parking lots. Elder Douglas Kliphon will look into this.

NEW BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported that she and Pastor Eric met with Lawrence Dowdell on May 10 concerning use of the kitchen as a Commissary Kitchen. He has a food truck and will be serving breakfast items. He does not need to use the kitchen on a regular basis. This is a common issue for food truck operators. Lawrence may need to use the kitchen a couple times a year for large special events. He offered a \$300 donation to the church for helping him get set up. He also indicated that he will make a couple donations per year. If he needs to use the kitchen in the future, we will work out the arrangements at that time. This use was approved by e-mail between meetings. All required paperwork and the \$300 donation have been received.

On April 28, Elder Leslie DuMond met with Anyi Dai concerning using the kitchen. Ms. Dai and her team are developing small-batch botanical products and need a commissary kitchen for light production and testing. She was provided with the Building Use Policy and application. She was also told about the need to provide evidence of liability insurance. Her team is in the early stages of business and does not expect to need to use the kitchen for one to two months.

Elders Leslie DuMond and Judith Parker met with Mark Miller on May 22. He has a food truck business Salt City Smokehouse. He has been in business for six years. He is having issues with his current Commissary Kitchen and would like to use our facilities. He would only be doing food preparation. He only needs to use the kitchen twice a month for just a short time each time. He is offering a donation of \$200 per month and will provide the \$100 security deposit. He has provided all of the required paperwork and insurance certificate. By motion made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Leslie DuMond it was decided to allow Mark Miller to use the kitchen on the terms referenced above. Motion passed.

It was noted that the emergency contacts listed in the elevator are Gill Laroche and Jerome O’Neill. We will need to update this. It was determined that Gill Laroche will be asked if he is willing to remain a contact for this purpose. Elder Douglas Kliphon will also be included in place of Jerome O’Neill.

In lieu of the October 24 dinner, it has been suggested that we hold a "Foodless Dinner". This was done back in 2009 and raised approximately \$600. We would simply ask that people write a check to CUC for the amount they would normally spend to come to our chicken and biscuit dinners (\$15). Leslie DuMond distributed a proposed flyer. By motion made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker it was decided to hold a Foodless Dinner fundraiser in lieu of the October 24 dinner. Motion passed.

During the April 9 dinner, Ed Busco reached out to waiting customers concerning their meal preferences and how they heard about our dinner. Approximately one dozen people attended the baked ziti dinner in December. Another dozen said they were interested in attending the dinner scheduled for this December. Customers were asked if they had any suggestions of any other meals we could provide. No one did.

When asked how they heard about us, over 30 said they heard by word of mouth through friends and church members. Customers mentioned seeing information on the Channel 9 events calendar, Spectrum News, and Facebook. We were told that the following churches had our flyer on their bulletin boards: Minoa Methodist, First United, and St. Matthews. More than 10 customers mentioned our electronic message board. Eight customers said they saw the advertisement on the ESM School boards.

Panera Bread is offering a fundraising event at participating locations between July 1 and July 31. When supporters bring the event flyer, they will donate 30% of net sales from their purchases to the organization. Discussion took place concerning this event. Elder Judith Parker will look into it further.

There will be a national bell ringing event on July 4<sup>th</sup> to celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the US. All churches, municipalities and any others with bells may participate. Bells will be rung simultaneously. This will happen in our time zone at 2:50 p.m. It was determined to announce this to the congregation to see if anyone would like to participate by ringing the church bells.

The next meeting of the CUC Board will be June 17, 2026, at 6:00 p.m.

We cannot accept donations of microwaves, TV's, large appliances, large furniture, entertainment centers, humidifiers, dehumidifiers, skis, computers, or large exercise equipment as we have to pay to dispose of some of these items if they are left over after the sale.
