Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE APRIL 23, 2025 CUC BOARD MEETING

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of March 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2025. Motion passed.

<u>PASTOR'S REPORT:</u> Rev. Adamcik reported he will be out May 19-23 to attend the Early Ministry Institute, paid for by Presbytery.

He will be out July 28 - 31 to chaperone Triennium (PCUSA high school youth conference) in Louisville for our Presbytery. He noted the Presbytery asked to use our parking lot to park 1 or 2 small buses before the group leaves. They would only occupy the spaces for a couple hours, and be able to get right on the Thruway.

Proposed summer pulpit exchange with Pebble Hill: Rev. Courtney Steininger would preach both services, Rev. Adamcik would preach at Pebble Hill. The board members expressed interest in this.

<u>BUILDING AND GROUNDS:</u> The fire suppression system inspection was done on April 1. Gill Laroche handled it. Gill Laroche has continued to address issues relating to toilets in the upstairs ladies' room. He also monitors the needs of groups relating to use of the gas stove.

Gill and Pam Laroche worked on cleaning up and weeding the flower beds. A new shrub is needed for outside the entrance way.

Ginnie Busco continues to clean the church on a weekly basis.

<u>CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:</u> The final session of the Lenten Bible Study took place on April 13. It was well attended and good conversations took place. We will consider another study in the near future.

The movie Passion of the Christ was shown on Saturday, April 12, from 4:00-6:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Eight attended. We will be showing the movie Risen on May 3, from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Refreshments will be served. A flyer will be sent to local churches and the Presbytery and Methodist Conference.

MISSIONS: Elder Merle Oswald reported concerning the following mission projects:

<u>St. Matthews Food Pantry</u> - For April, our Mission Fund donated \$200 to defray the cost of eggs. For May, we will collect full size men's and women's shampoo.

Francis House – During March, we collected items to be donated to Francis House. <u>WORSHIP:</u> Elder Connie Heidt-Oliver submitted a written report as follows:

- Communion Rev. Adamcik served communion by intinction to 26 on April 6. Elders Karen Brignall and Connie Oliver served as communion assistants.
- We hosted FUCOES on Maundy Thursday, April 17, at 6 p.m. for a soup, bread, and fruit for dinner (12 attended).
 At 7 p.m., a worship service with communion took place (27 from FUCOES and CUC).
- On Easter, April 20 at 7 a.m., a worship service was held in the garden (18 attended). Hot cross buns, quick breads, and beverages were served between services.

<u>OLD BUSINESS:</u> It was noted that Christy Knowlton will be on vacation on April 27. Andrea Scerbo will fill in. The choir will not sing that morning.

An issue has arisen concerning the need to obtain an insurance certificate from anyone that wishes to use the building. Our insurance representative has expressed the opinion that we should limit building use to church members. It was determined that we will consider these recommendations when addressing requests for use of the building. It was also noted that the space should be thoroughly checked before returning any security deposit.

Karen Delello, Karen's Twisted Flavors, cancelled her April 25 scheduled pop-up dinner event.

Planet Aid will be sending us a check for \$58.87 for donations made for the first quarter of 2025.

NEW BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported concerning the copier lease. 5 Star Business Machines has been acquired by Ed & Ed Business Technology. She met with Brice Hodges, the Technology Consultant, and Moses (our service representative) concerning this change. Our Maintenance Agreement is up for renewal as of April 2, 2025.

Ed & Ed is proposing a new Lease and Maintenance Agreement. Moses will continue to be our service representative. The agreement provides for nearly identical coverage as we had with 5 Star. We will get a new refurbished machine with similar features and will include a staple feature. They are proposing a 3-year agreement at a cost just slightly higher than the previous contract. We will have the option of paying on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the agreements with Ed & Ed Business Technology. Elder Pamela Laroche asked that the billing be set up quarterly.

The 4-H program will be holding its Spring Fling in our Fellowship Hall on Sunday afternoon, April 27, from 12:00 – 4:00 p.m.

Elder Connie Oliver provided a written report concerning problems with the piano in the church lounge that is used for choir practice. The options were discussed, including an offer of a free piano by our piano tuner. It was determined that before taking any action, we should get the opinion of Christy Knowlton and have the piano looked at by a service technician. The matter was tabled.

It was noted that the price of stamps will be increasing again in July. Elder Pam Laroche will stock up prior to that time.

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The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

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Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of March 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2025. Motion passed.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE APRIL 23, 2025 CUC BOARD MEETING

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of March 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2025. Motion passed.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE APRIL 23, 2025 CUC BOARD MEETING

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of March 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2025. Motion passed.

<u>PASTOR'S REPORT:</u> Rev. Adamcik reported he will be out May 19-23 to attend the Early Ministry Institute, paid for by Presbytery.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

An issue has arisen concerning the need to obtain an insurance certificate from anyone that wishes to use the building. NEW BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported concerning the copier lease. 5 Star Business Machines has been acquired by Ed & Ed Business Technology. She met with Brice Hodges, the Technology Consultant, and Moses (our service representative) concerning this change. Our Maintenance Agreement is up for renewal as of April 2, 2025.

Ed & Ed is proposing a new Lease and Maintenance Agreement. Moses will continue to be our service representative. The agreement provides for nearly identical coverage as we had with 5 Star. We will get a new refurbished machine with similar features and will include a staple feature. They are proposing a 3-year agreement at a cost just slightly higher than the previous contract. We will have the option of paying on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the agreements with Ed & Ed Business Technology. Elder Pamela Laroche asked that the billing be set up quarterly.

The 4-H program will be holding its Spring Fling in our Fellowship Hall on Sunday afternoon, April 27, from 12:00 – 4:00 p.m.

Elder Connie Oliver provided a written report concerning problems with the piano in the church lounge that is used for choir practice. Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

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Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

We will get a new refurbished machine with similar features and will include a staple feature. They are proposing a 3-year agreement at a cost just slightly higher than the previous contract. We will have the option of paying on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the agreements with Ed & Ed Business Technology. Elder Pamela Laroche asked that the billing be set up quarterly.

Elder Connie Oliver provided a written report concerning problems with the piano in the church lounge that is used for choir practice. Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

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Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on April 23, 2025, at 6:01p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Emeline McShane opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Jerome O'Neill served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Judith Parker and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of March 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of March 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2025. Motion passed.

An issue has arisen concerning the need to obtain an insurance certificate from anyone that wishes to use the building. Our insurance representative has expressed the opinion that we should limit building use to church members. It was also noted that the space should be thoroughly checked before returning any security deposit.

Planet Aid will be sending us a check for \$58.87 for donations made for the first quarter of 2025.

NEW BUSINESS: Elder Leslie DuMond reported concerning the copier lease. 5 Star Business Machines has been acquired by Ed & Ed Business Technology. She met with Brice Hodges, the Technology Consultant, and Moses (our service representative) concerning this change. Our Maintenance Agreement is up for renewal as of April 2, 2025.

Ed & Ed is proposing a new Lease and Maintenance Agreement. Moses will continue to be our service representative. The agreement provides for nearly identical coverage as we had with 5 Star. We will get a new refurbished machine with similar features and will include a staple feature. They are proposing a 3-year agreement at a cost just slightly higher than the previous contract. We will have the option of paying on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Judith Parker to approve the agreements with Ed & Ed Business Technology. Elder Pamela Laroche asked that the billing be set up quarterly.

The 4-H program will be holding its Spring Fling in our Fellowship Hall on Sunday afternoon, April 27, from 12:00 – 4:00 p.m.

Elder Connie Oliver provided a written report concerning problems with the piano in the church lounge that is used for choir practice. The options were discussed, including an offer of a free piano by our piano tuner. Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Pastor's Message



Retreat.

A word that means a lot of things.

The first meaning comes from a military context, especially as we come off Memorial Day, "Retreat" means falling back; abandoning a battle you cannot hope to win.

The second meaning comes from a spiritual context, where "Retreat" means leaving our usual setting to regain ourselves.

What if I told you both of these meanings are equally important to spiritual health?

Because we, as a society, like to look down on people who give up.

We see them as cowardly or evasive, not willing to stand up and face the music. And yet, there are some battles we cannot win.

People who don't want to listen to us.

In the military sense, "Retreat" isn't about surrender; it's about picking the battles you can win. Conserving resources so you live to fight another day.

"Retreat" can be as simple as coming home after a hard day, acknowledging that we feel overwhelmed, and maybe need to approach something differently or go to an entirely new approach.

Jesus did this in many ways as well; he knew the Romans wouldn't listen to him. So, he picked the most marginalized people, the ones who were sick or impure, to hear his message. The people who would hear him because their hearts were open to the Holy Spirit.

Though the Roman Empire wouldn't convert to Christianity for another 300 years, Jesus planted the seeds for that to happen.

He picked his battles, and in so doing, built a foundation that would win the war for religious freedom 300 years later.

And so, let us look at this summer season as a chance to Retreat in both senses; to fall back, and to renew ourselves, acknowledging that we can't win every battle we fight, but we can always win something in all this.

Let us always be ready to plant the seeds for crops that will bloom after we have passed on.

Like Jesus, let us have a vision that far outlasts us, as we look to make any kind of difference in our world now, knowing that act will ripple throughout the Earth and God's ministry.

On the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).
