Chicken & Biscuit Dinner Results





This regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on March 26, 2025, at 6:02 p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge. Elder Connie Oliver opened the meeting with prayer and Elder Pamela Laroche served as moderator.

<u>MINUTES</u>: A motion was properly made by Elder Merle Oswald and seconded by Elder Edward Busco to approve the regular Session minutes of February 26, 2025. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elder Pamela Laroche presented the financial reports of the church for the month of February 2025. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Connie Oliver to accept the Treasurer's Report for February 2025. Motion passed.

VITAL STATISTICS: Edward Busco was ordained as an Elder on February 26, 2025.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Rev. Adamcik reported he will be out May 19-23 to attend the Early Ministry Institute through the Presbytery for first call ministers. It will be held at Silver Bay in Lake Placid. Rev. Courtney Stiner from Pebble Hill Presbyterian Church will also be attending. This program will be paid for by the Presbytery.

He reported that the Bible study is going well. There have been good discussions. There is potential for a summer study depending on anticipated attendance.

More themed Sundays like Mr. Rogers would be fantastic.

<u>BUILDING AND GROUNDS:</u> The Onondaga County Health Department inspection took place on March 13, 2025. There were no issues. The fire suppression system will be due soon for the semiannual inspection service. Gill Laroche will handle this.

Gill Laroche fixed the acolyte wands and replaced the flapper in the upstairs women's toilet. He continues to take the bottles and cans to the redemption center.

Dave Vollmer plowed the parking lots 13 times over the winter.

Ginnie Busco continues to do weekly cleaning of the church.

<u>MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM</u>: Elder Emeline McShane submitted a written report as follows:

The membership directory is done. She needs Jeannine's photo from Facebook that she wants.

Cards/calls/visits are continuing as per the "list". We are not doing birthday / anniversary cards right now (at least to my knowledge).

A new member class was held on March 19. We will be welcoming three new members on April 6th during the service, Georgia Clifford, Amy Caldeira and Joe Hudgins, Jr. The 50-year membership recognition will take place on May 18th.

"Tater eliminator" - could this be in parallel with the parking lot space / garage sale event that First has? This matter was tabled.

We have scheduled two upcoming movie showings. The Passion of the Christ will be shown on Saturday, April 12, from 4:00 – 6:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. We will be showing the movie Risen on May 3, from 4:00 – 6:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Refreshments will be served.

<u>MISSIONS</u>: Elder Merle Oswald reported concerning the following mission projects:

<u>St. Matthews Food Pantry</u> – In February, we collected 2 boxes of food and 59 egg cartons for St. Matthew's Food Pantry. We are also collecting cake mixes which will be blessed by Pastor Eric on March 30. For April, our Mission Fund will donate \$200 to defray the cost of eggs.

<u>Francis House</u> – We are also collecting items for Francis House. The deadline for that is this Sunday, March 30.

<u>One Great Hour</u> - For April, we will collect monetary donations for One Great Hour of Sharing.

<u>Adopt-A-Highway</u> - On Sunday, April 27, following the worship service, we will pick up garbage from the corner of Route 298 and Fly Road up to the Thruway Bridge.

<u>Sleep In Heavenly Peace</u> – We are considering building beds at the Sleep In Heavenly Peace facility on May 28 from 5:00 – 8:00 p.m. So far, 6 or 7 people have expressed an interest in helping with this mission. - Board Meeting Minutes Continued -

PASTOR/PARISH RELATIONS: Elder Edward Busco reported a meeting was held on March 20, 2025. Evaluations of the organist and office secretary were discussed. Rev. Adamcik was also interviewed for his upcoming anniversary. It was noted that the secretary has not asked for a raise this year. The committee recommended the organist receive a raise and that Rev. Adamcik receive a raise based on the recommendation of the Presbytery. After discussion, it was determined to give the organist an increase and to approve an increase for Rev. Adamcik, effective on his anniversary date, April 1. A motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Oswald to accept the recommendation of the PPRC and approve the increases as indicated. Motion passed.

<u>STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE</u>: Elder Leslie DuMond reported the letter requesting contributions to our per capita and apportionment requirements will be sent out after Easter.

WORSHIP: Elder Connie Oliver reported as follows:

- Communion Rev. Adamcik served communion by intinction to 21 on March 2. Elders Valerie Warfield and Connie Oliver served as communion assistants.
- Ash Wednesday, March 5 noon service with imposition of ashes had 10 in attendance. An evening service held at FUCOES that evening had ~ 30 for soup meal and service.
- March 23 Pastor Eric honored Mr. Rogers multiple times throughout the service, while the congregation joined in the fun by wearing cardigans/ sweaters/ tennis shoes!

<u>OLD BUSINESS:</u> Elder Leslie DuMond reported that she contacted Planet Aid to determine whether CUC can benefit from donations made in the box located at Vollmer's farm. She also contacted Dave Vollmer about this and he has no problem with it. She has provided the required W-9 form concerning the church's taxexempt status. The Planet Aid representative will meet with Dave Vollmer within the next couple weeks for him to sign a new agreement. We will receive 5 cents a pound on a quarterly basis, starting with the 1st quarter of 2025.

Elder Leslie DuMond reported concerning the following relating to rental of the church facilities:

The "Policy on Use of Building" and the Application have been updated. The updated documents were distributed to Board members via e-mail. Elder Pamela Laroche recommended some minor changes. Motion was made by Elder Merle Oswald and seconded by Elder Pamela Laroche to approve the updated documents, as amended. Motion passed.

Various requests to use the Fellowship Hall have been withdrawn.

- Board Meeting Minutes Continued -

Andrew Smith met with the Onondaga County Health Department inspector and has been approved to use the kitchen for his BBQ sauce business.

Karen Delello, Karen's Twisted Flavors, would like to use the Fellowship Hall and kitchen for some "pop up" meal events. She has now asked to use the kitchen as her "home base" on record for the Onondaga County Health Department under a Commissary Agreement. This is the same arrangement that we now have with Andrew Smith. Elder Leslie DuMond noted she spoke to the health inspector and he advised that there are no ramifications to the church for having outside people use the kitchen. This has become common. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Elder Connie Oliver to approve the Commissary Agreement with Karen Delello. Motion passed.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u>: Elder Connie Oliver reported Christy Knowlton will be on vacation on April 27. She has reached out to Andrea Scerbo concerning filling in. She said she would be happy to.

Elder Leslie DuMond reported concerning the following relating to rental of the church facilities:

The Adirondack Club will be using the Fellowship Hall and kitchen on April 12. They were advised of the new rates and had no problem with the increase. We have received their payment. Since they have been using our facilities for many years, they were not asked to provide a security deposit.

Suzanne Masters is a yoga instructor and artist. She has reached out via word of mouth. She is looking to start up yoga classes and possibly some art classes. She needs extra income and at this point is not in a position to pay much for use of the space. She is proposing offering free senior chair yoga classes for our members and members of First United until she gets established. She is proposing to have classes on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 10:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. Discussion took place concerning this request. It was determined to table it until after heating season and to reach out further to Ms. Masters concerning outside interest.

Cindy Hare has asked to use the Fellowship Hall on April 19, from 4:30 to 6:30 for her dad's 85th birthday party. They will bring in their own food and will not require use of the kitchen. She anticipates approximately 30 people; mostly family. She has been provided with our updated Policy on Use of Building and completed the Application for Use of Church Facilities. She also provided a \$100 cash security deposit. She has asked that we waive the insurance requirement. Motion was made by Elder Leslie DuMond and seconded by Edward Busco to approve use of the Fellowship Hall by Cindy Hare and to waive the insurance requirement. Motion passed. - Board Meeting Minutes Continued -

Elder Pamela Laroche reported she has looked into purchasing folders for welcome packets since our supply is very low. It was determined to further research the options due to the high cost of obtaining them from a local printer.

It was suggested that we consider publishing the dinners on more social media sites, such as East Syracuse Current Situations.

The next meeting of the CUC Board will be April 23, 2025, at 6:00 p.m.
