

Thanksgiving is just barely in the rear-view mirror and upon entering the beautifully decorated sanctuary November 30, the first Sunday of Advent was apparent. Communion was served by intinction to 31 on November 2.

A month full of special Sundays, we lifted up our loved ones in heaven on All Saints Day, honored our Veterans, along with Christ the King and the first Sunday of Advent. We were fortunate to have Andrea Scerbo fill in two Sundays when Christy was not available.

November's messages included "Say It Plain," "Now The Service Begins," "Abundance!" "Kingly" and "Stay Ready."

From his continuing education course, he shared about 'moral injury.' It is a term that originated while counseling Vietnam veterans, whose PTSD resulted in a "soul wound."

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE October 29,2025 CUC BOARD MEETING

The regular meeting of the Board of the Collamer United Church was called to order on October 29, 2025, at 6:05 p.m. in the Collamer United Church lounge.

<u>GUEST PRESENTATION:</u> Rev. Monica Styron, Chair, Social Justice Committee of the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse, introduced herself and was introduced to the Board members. She asked what members thought is breaking God's heart and discussion took place. She discussed the current situation where SNAP benefits will be withheld from those in need due to the government shutdown. She also discussed the needs of the various programs run by InterFaith Works. Rev. Styron was thanked for her presentation and excused from the meeting.

<u>MINUTES:</u> A motion was properly made by Elder Connie Oliver and seconded by Elder Merle Oswald to approve the regular Session minutes of September 24, 2025. Motion passed.

<u>PASTOR'S REPORT:</u> Rev. Adamcik reminded the Board that he will be on vacation November 24 – 28 for the Thanksgiving holiday.

Rev. Adamcik noted that both churches will be holding All Saints Day remembrance services on the same day, November 2.

Rev. Adamcik reported he is taking an online continuing education class offered through Union Theological Seminary. This class on Moral Injury is about recognizing moral violations in our ministry, how to address them, and how to heal them. It's very helpful for the pastoral care part of his duties in particular. The best definition from Dr Jonathan Shay: "moral injury is: (a) A betrayal of what's 'right;' (b) either by a person of legitimate authority or oneself; and (c) in a high stakes situation." This course meets on Thursday evenings, from October 16 through November 6. He will be taking another online course offered by Union Seminary. That course is about preaching, and will meet on Thursday evenings in February. He is also planning to attend an Emerging Leaders Cohort that will gather March 22-25, 2026 in Lake Tahoe, presented by Auburn Seminary, a separate entity from Union.

Rev. Adamcik reported he volunteered to be commissioner to the Synod for the meeting to be held in Amsterdam, New York, on November 15. All expenses related to the meeting will be covered by the Presbytery. There will be a Presbytery meeting on November 19.

<u>BUILDING AND GROUNDS:</u> Gill Laroche repacked the shed with the rummage sale supplies. He delivered bottles/cans and cleared up the account totaling \$55.00.

Ginnie Busco is continuing to do weekly cleaning. Gill Laroche set mouse traps in the office and a lone mouse was caught.

Gill Laroche and Vollmer's employee, Shawn, mowed the lawn. Gill and Pam Laroche cut back plants and ornamental grasses. The wind screen at the front entrance was installed.

Gill Laroche turned off gas to the stove and recapped the vent. The Jerome Fire Equipment inspection was conducted on October 23, 2025, and passed.

Discussions with Gerharz Equipment concerning possible replacement of the stove are continuing.

MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM: Elder Emeline McShane reported that cards/calls/visits are continuing. She distributed a copy of the draft Pictural Membership Directory and asked that board members submit changes or comments. She also distributed the outreach list. It was noted that this list only includes information reported to the church office and that other outreach has taken place. It was suggested that on a weekly basis, a card for one person on the prayer list be placed in the Narthex to be signed by the congregation. Moving forward, if anyone places someone on the prayer list, we will request that they ask the person or family being added if they would like a pastoral visit. We need to ask them so then we can directly let the pastor know.

<u>MISSIONS:</u> Elder Merle Oswald reported concerning the following mission projects:

St. Matthews Food Pantry - For October, we collected 70 cans of pumpkin pie filling, 3 boxes of food, and 19 egg cartons for St. Matthew's Food Pantry. They were dedicated by Pastor Eric on October 26, 2025. They were delivered by Merle Oswald on October 27, 2025. For November, we will be collecting boxed stuffing mix.

Crop Walk- We are continuing to collect donations for the Crop Walk.

Adopt-A-Highway- On October 26, 2025, immediately following the worship service, 6 of us enjoyed a beautiful fall day by picking up garbage from the corner of Route 298 and Fly Road up to the Thruway Bridge. Ginnie and Ed

Mercy House – In memory of Valerie Warfield's mom, we are having a special mission to support Mercy House of the Southern Tier located in Endicott, New York. <u>TECHNOLOGY:</u> Elder Judith Parker reported the Facebook page and website continue to be updated on a regular basis. We are advertising for crafters to rent tables at our upcoming Holiday Craft Sale.
